

ACCOLADES & ACHIEVEMENTS



The Center for Fraternity and Sorority Life community performed 12,000+ hours of community service and raised more than \$34,000 in giving. 51% of chapters earned a 3.0 GPA or higher.

Career Center increased employer engagement at career fairs by 77% and internships by 34.5%. Career coaches scheduled 14,500 advising appointments and offered 820 career workshops.





Supporting Parent Programs strengthens student success. Students whose parents participated in key programs experienced higher retention rates: 78% for those attending the Summer Send-Off Party, 85% for Parent Association members, and 81% for those who attended Family Weekend.

The Center for Leadership and Services advised seven student-led IMPACT Boards. These 38 students dedicated their time and talents to create and implement programs that served Denton County, the DFW area, and the UNT community. Together, they contributed over 6,100 hours of service, hosted 22 signature programs, and engaged more than 3,143 students, faculty, staff, and alumni.

UNT@Frisco had a **91% fall orientation yield** with 168 students participating in 13 First Flight programs.



Office of Disability Access distributed 18,154 accommodation letters and accommodated 5,766 tests.



Student Health and Wellness Center had 13,500+ visits, with 67% saying it helped them stay enrolled.

SUPPORTING OUR STUDENTS MENTAL HEALTH

Counseling and Testing Services (CTS) at the University of North Texas has seen continued success since launching a free online peer support network for UNT students. Togetherall, an anonymous platform, available 24/7, complements the university's existing mental health services by providing an accessible and supportive space for students to connect with others experiencing similar challenges.

Togetherall has seen significant engagement, with over 1,509 students registered during 2023-2024. Among these students,70% represent underserved populations, 62% are not seeking any formal mental health support, and 12% have no support.

Togetherall plays a critical role in supporting students in crisis, as individuals in need are directed to CTS for immediate assistance. This is particularly important given that 14% of registered users reported having considered suicide, and 15% had considered self-harm in the past. Additionally, users are actively engaging with the platform, with an average of 33.19 activities per member, including posts, comments, views, articles, self-assessments, goal setting, and journal entries.



Student Veteran Services earned the Gold Veterans Education Excellence Recognition Award (VEERA) for the third year. Student Veteran Services engaged with students 4,800 times through impactful programs, including 70 personalized tours that led to 68 enrollments. They also provided \$9,100 in emergency aid to 10 military, veteran, and dependent students.

APOLLO SCHOLARSHIP ENDOWMENT SUPPORTS STUDENT VETERANS

The Paul and Sally Houdayer Foundation established the \$50,000 Apollo Scholarship Endowment in honor of UNT alumnus Evan Hudec ('17) and his late service dog, Apollo. The endowment supports veteran students at UNT through emergency scholarships, covering critical needs such as tuition, textbooks, car repairs and medical bills.

Evan, a veteran of the 1st Armored Division and the 3rd Infantry Division, served two tours in Iraq before pursuing his B.S. in Emergency Administration and Planning with a minor in Public Administration at UNT. During his studies, Evan was accompanied by Apollo, who became an integral part of his college journey. Apollo even walked across the stage with Evan at graduation, symbolizing the unwavering bond they shared.

Apollo's passing in March 2022 inspired the Houdayer Foundation to honor the pair's story. This endowment ensures their legacy lives on by providing meaningful support to fellow veterans as they navigate their academic and personal journeys.



The Moody Foundation awarded a \$1.1 million M-Pact Fund grant to enhance educational outcomes for students with foster care experience.

In Texas, only 3% of students with foster care experience earn a college degree. Although the state offers a tuition and fee waiver for higher education, 40% of eligible students do not use it. Research indicates that students who utilize the waiver are 3.5 times more likely to graduate.

With the Division of Student Affairs serving as the operational hub, the grant supports a collaboration between DSA's PUSH program and Education Reach for Texas to better understand the barriers preventing waiver usage and develop actionable solutions. It also funds a peer mentor program with Education Reach for Texas focused on increasing the number of students utilizing the Texas Tuition and Fee Waiver and enhancing students' engagement with campus support programs.







Over \$16,000

was raised by DSA staff members through a faculty and staff campaign, giving back to UNT.

\$10,000

was donated to DSA programs during UNT's Day of Giving, almost doubling last year's gifts.

200+ goodie bags

were made for and donated to the Children's Advocacy Center of Denton during 2023 Homecoming week.

1,200 hours

of service were volunteered during Make a Difference Day to support projects around Denton County.

921 hours

of community service was completed by first-year Emerald Eagle Scholars.

Over \$5,500

was contributed by DSA staff members during the State Employees Charitable Campaign.

The Community Garden donated 30 pounds of produce to the Food Pantry, providing vegetables for those in need.



SUPPORT FROM CAPITAL ONE DRIVES SUCCESS

Each semester at UNT concludes with celebrations of student success, and Spring 2024 was no exception. The Graduation Celebration, supported by Capital One's ongoing commitment to first-generation students, recognized nearly 70 graduates from the First-Generation Success Center and Emerald Eagle Scholars Program.

"It's important to honor their hard work and provide a space to celebrate with their loved ones," said Taylor Mireles, Emerald Eagle Scholars student services coordinator.

The Emerald Eagle Scholars Program helps academically talented students with financial need turn their college dreams into reality. Unlike other tuition guarantee programs, Emerald Eagle Scholars benefit from personalized support through Student Affairs.

In addition to covering tuition and mandatory fees for four years, scholars participate in engagement activities—such as campus jobs, student organizations, or community service—each semester to stay connected and on track. First-year scholars also take part in Access Mentoring.

The approach works. 88% of the Fall 2023 Emerald Eagle Scholars cohort returned the following year, with an average GPA of 3.2, exceeding their peers. Students in the First-Generation Success Center achieved a 91% retention rate and an average GPA of 3.15 in the fall and 3.24 in the spring.





ADDRESSING STUDENTS' FINANCIAL BARRIERS

Food insecurity affects one-third of students at four-year institutions nationwide. Last year, **4,554 students**, across **18,300 visits**, relied on the UNT Food Pantry Presented by Kroger for assistance. The funding that the food pantry has received from Kroger since 2021 has helped to make their continued support of UNT's students possible.

As part of the Diamond Eagle Student Resource Center (DESRC), the food pantry is one of four programs developed to address students' financial barriers, including the Suit Up Closet, Mean Green Gowns for Grads, and the We Mean Green Fund (WMGF).

"The DESRC transforms lives by addressing financial and basic needs while fostering community," said Dr. Laura Smith, UNT dean of students.

DESRC programs like Suit Up allow students to access professional attire, who may not otherwise be able to afford an interview outfit. Gowns for Grads opens the opportunity to celebrate graduation, allowing students to rent graduation regalia, which normally retails anywhere from \$55 to \$1,200, depending on the degree plan.

In addition to support from sponsors like Kroger and Charles Schwab, which awarded a \$4,000 grant for the Suit Up closet, the DESRC receives both physical and financial donations throughout the year.



LEADERSHIP. SERVICE. EXCELLENCE.

NT40 has been a symbol of excellence for over 50 years, uniting the best and brightest to inspire personal growth, campus engagement, and lifelong connections.

This year, NT40 introduced the Soaring Wings Award, a new leadership recognition program honoring staff and faculty whose exceptional service often goes unnoticed. The inaugural award was presented to the Union Custodial Staff in recognition of their dedication and willingness to go above and beyond.

Known as the Top 40 Leaders on campus, NT40 members collectively participate in 75 student organizations, hold 60 leadershiproles—including 10 presidencies—andmaintain an impressive average GPA of 3.4.

Half a century after its founding, NT40 continues to leave a lasting impact on UNT, shaping campus life through their leadership, service and commitment to excellence.





ORIENTATION PROGRAMS SET THE FOUNDATION

From the moment students step onto campus for orientation, the foundation is laid for their success.

Freshman Orientation programs showed a 3.38% increase in participation. A total of 6,788 students attended, and of those, 97% enrolled for the fall semester. While Transfer Orientation participation saw a slight dip, the impact remains strong, with 94% of attendees enrolling to continue their educational journey at UNT.

Orientation is just the beginning. Since 2012, UNT has produced more than 105,000 degree holders equating to an economic impact of \$5.4 billion in potential annual earnings. Graduates are stepping into critical roles across industries, fueling workforce development and strengthening the state's economic growth.

RECREATION. COMPETITION. ACHIEVEMENT.

This past year, the Pohl Recreation Center welcomed over 436,000 participants, an 11% increase from the previous year.

UNT's 37 sport clubs had an exceptional year, with 149 students competing in regional and national events. The Polo Club claimed consecutive championships, while the Climbing Club and Powerlifting teams also achieved impressive rankings. UNT Esports, with four varsity teams, competed in 342 matches, with the Women's Valorant team earning top spots. Outdoor Pursuits hosted 11 trips, logging 2,162 contact hours and providing enriching outdoor experiences.

The Rec Center, which opened in 2003, has grown alongside UNT's expanding community. As the campus population has increased, so has the demand for recreational sports, reflecting UNT's commitment to students' physical and mental well-being.
